INTRODUCTION

This Convening Circular conveys, in accordance with Article 4 of the Constitution, the call from the Archbishop of Algoma with the concurrence of the Executive Committee, to assemble a meeting of the Synod in Sault Ste. Marie on Thursday, May 8, 2025, commencing at 8:30 a.m. until Saturday, May 10, 2025, at 1:00 p.m.

As noted in the February 5, 2025 memorandum, this Circular is issued in accordance with Section C, Article 4 and is available to you one month before the meeting of Synod. While the order of business to be discussed may vary, the business mentioned in the Circular shall have precedence over all other business.

This document has two main purposes. Mostly, it is used by members of Synod who will read through these pages to find the details of the meeting and to find information used to conduct the business of Synod. This information consists of the formal Notices of Motion, lists of members and officers of the Diocese, committee reports, the diocesan financial statements, and supporting information.

This Convening Circular is also the publication of record for the Diocese of Algoma. It has a function similar to that of a report to the shareholders of a corporation. In this respect, the Circular could be called a Bi-annual report of the Diocese of Algoma.

The meeting arrangements for Synod, the time, place, registration, costs, and hotel facilities are outlined in detail in the Diocesan Treasurer's Memorandum of February 5, 2025. It is intended that all advance material shall constitute the delegate's copies of the 2025 Algoma Synod Journal. The post-Synod material will, therefore, only consist of the copies of those reports distributed at Synod and the actual Synod Minutes and Proceedings. These exhibits can then be added to complete the 2025 Algoma Synod Journal.

Page Numbers:

The pages of the Circular are numbered consecutively from Number 1, commencing with this Introduction, followed by the Table of Contents. Sufficient blank pages have been reserved to allow for the inclusion of the Bishop's Charge, as well as the aforementioned material to complete the Synod Journal, following the conclusion of Synod. Any unused page numbers will be recorded in the new Table of Contents at that time. The Reports Section commences at Page 101 with the 2024 Financial Statements, followed by the other Committee Reports.



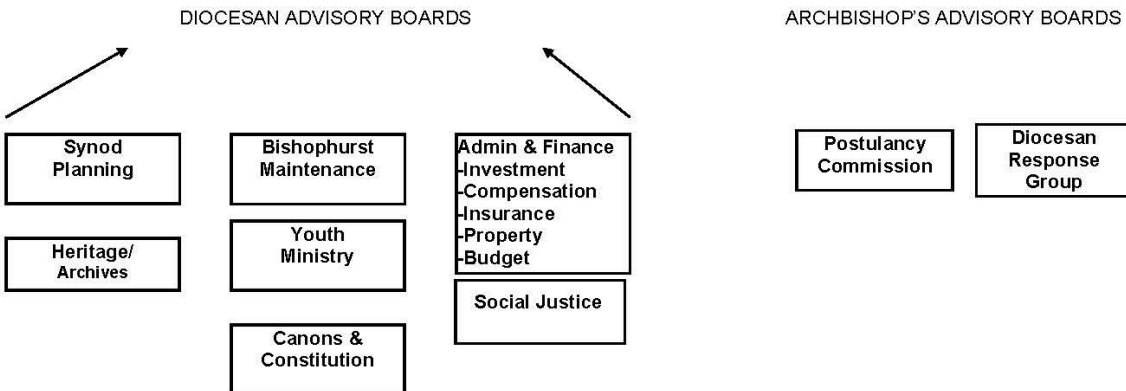
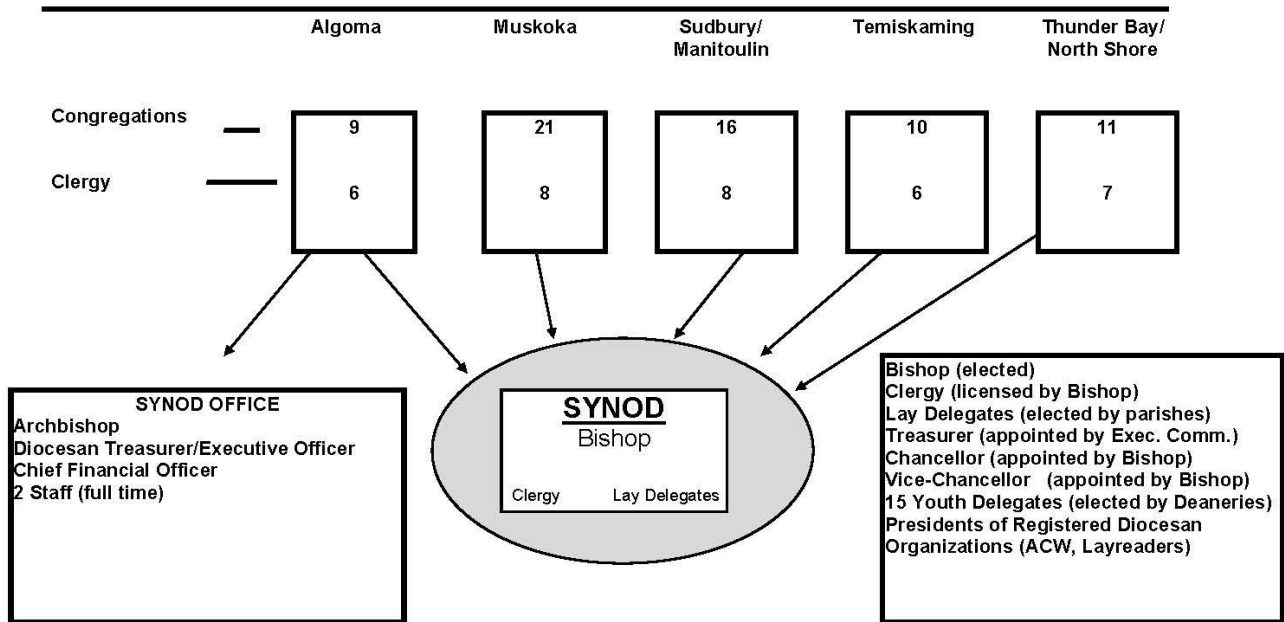

**NOTICE OF CANONICAL MOTIONS TO SYNOD 2025
ENDORSED BY THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE
AND PREPARED BY THE
CONSTITUTION AND CANONS COMMITTEE**

Amendment to Article 3, Section 2 of the Constitution –

Moved that this Synod 2025 amend Article 3, Section 2 of the Constitution to allow at least one Synod delegate to be elected from each congregation.

2. number of delegates:

- a) Every ~~separate parish~~ **congregation**, regardless of the number of its congregations, shall be entitled to elect one lay delegate and an alternate. **In the case of the election of more than one delegate, the chair of the vestry shall sign a certificate stating the number of canonical voters and forward it to the Secretary of the Synod with the certificate of election.**
- b) If the number of its canonical voters exceeds one hundred, the ~~parish~~ **congregation** shall be entitled to two lay delegates. If the number of its canonical voters exceeds two hundred the ~~parish~~ **congregation** shall be entitled to three lay delegates.
- ~~c) Not more than one delegate in each parish shall be a non-resident of that parish.~~
- ~~d) Parishes consisting of one congregation shall elect their delegates at the annual vestry meeting next preceding the regular meeting of Synod. Diocese of Algoma – May 2019~~
- ~~e) In parishes consisting of more than one congregation, the parish may elect the delegate to which it is entitled in a manner in which all of the congregations agree. If the congregations do not agree, the following method shall be used:
 - ~~(i) every organized congregation, at the annual vestry meeting before the regular meeting of Synod, shall:
 - ~~(a) have the right to nominate one person for election as delegate to Synod; and~~
 - ~~(b) communicate the name immediately to the incumbent.~~~~
 - ~~(ii) The incumbent shall:~~~~

~~(a) receive nominations from the congregations, and~~

~~(b) send a complete list of them to the churchwardens of each congregation in the parish.~~

~~(iii) Vestry meetings at which such nominations are made shall be adjourned for a period of two weeks, and at the adjourned annual meeting in each congregation, those present and entitled to vote shall record their votes in favour of any one of the nominees.~~

~~(iv) In the absence of the incumbent the chair of the meeting shall immediately communicate the result of the vote to the incumbent.~~

~~(v) The incumbent shall declare:~~

~~(a) the nominee receiving the highest number of votes in the parish elected as delegate, and~~

~~(b) the nominee receiving the next highest number of votes as the alternate.~~

~~(vi) In the case of a tie, the incumbent has the deciding vote.~~

~~f) (i) In parishes consisting of more than one congregation, a congregation having more than one hundred canonical votes shall be entitled to elect one lay delegate.~~

~~(ii) The other congregation or congregations shall be entitled to elect one other lay delegate, who, where there are two or more other Diocese of Algoma—May 2019 congregations, shall be chosen by the method provided in paragraph 2(f) of this Article.~~

when no incumbent:

c) In any case where there is no incumbent, the Territorial Archdeacon shall act to ensure the provisions of this Constitution are followed.

notification of synod office:

d) The incumbent and churchwardens shall forward to the Synod Office the names of the delegates elected at the annual vestry meeting within one month following that meeting.

nomination at any vestry:

For sufficient cause, lay delegates may be nominated and elected in the manner provided above at any vestry meeting called for the purpose, provided that the provisions for the calling of a vestry meeting are followed.

Be it resolved that the Thunder Bay-North Shore Deanery Council refer the following to the next regular meeting of Diocesan Synod for consideration:

Add the following definition of Shared Ministry to Canon H-5: ESTABLISHMENT AND DISSOLUTION OF CONGREGATIONS AND PARISHES.

Shared Ministry: Shared ministry is a ministry model where two or more parishes enter into an arrangement which includes the sharing of the Incumbent(s). The details of the Shared Ministry are specified in a Covenant of Shared Ministry that ensures a common understanding about the arrangements. The parishes retain their identity as separate parishes with separate administrations; they are not consolidated into a single parish. This allows each parish to continue its unique ministry to the local community and wider church.

And,

Amend Canon H-5: ESTABLISHMENT AND DISSOLUTION OF CONGREGATIONS AND PARISHES paragraph 3 to read:

As has been the custom of the Diocese since the formation of the Synod, the Bishop may divide a parish into two or more new parishes, bring two or more parishes together in a Shared Ministry, consolidate two or more parishes into a single new parish, transfer a congregation between parishes, or transfer one or more congregations from a dissolved parish to another parish or parishes, after consultation with the Executive Committee, and appoint such new Incumbent or Incumbents as the Bishop finds appropriate in conformity with ~~the applicable~~ Canon I-1 ~~on a~~ Appointments to Charges.

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INDEPENDENT PRACTITIONER'S REVIEW ENGAGEMENT REPORT

To The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Algoma:

I have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Algoma that comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2024 and the statements of revenue and expenditures and changes in fund balances, and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Practitioner's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express a conclusion on the accompanying financial statements based on my review. I conducted my review in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements, which requires me to comply with relevant ethical requirements.

A review of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements is a limited assurance engagement. The practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of making inquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less in extent than, and vary in nature from, those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Accordingly, I do not express an audit opinion on these financial statements.

Conclusion

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2024

The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Algoma ("The Diocese") is incorporated without share capital under a special Act of the Ontario Provincial Legislature. The Diocese is a not-for-profit organization and is exempt from income taxes.

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian Accounting Standards for Not-For-Profit Organizations (ASNPO) and include the following significant accounting policies:

Cash and Term Deposits

Cash and term deposits consist of bank balances, short-term deposits and investments in money market instruments.

Capital Assets

Capital asset expenditures for office and computer equipment with a cost of less than \$10,000 are treated as expenditures in the period incurred.

Financial Instruments

The Diocese considers any contract creating a financial asset, liability or equity instrument as a financial instrument, except in certain limited circumstances. The Diocese accounts for the following as financial instruments:

- Cash and term deposits
- Marketable securities
- Receivables
- Loans receivable
- Mortgage receivable
- Bank indebtedness
- Accounts payable and accrued liabilities

A financial asset or liability is recognized when the Diocese becomes party to contractual provisions of the instrument.

The Diocese initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value, except for certain non-arm's length transactions.

Financial assets or liabilities obtained in related party transactions are measured in accordance with the accounting policy for related party transactions except for those transactions that are with a person or entity whose sole relationship with the entity is in the capacity of management, in which case they are accounted for in accordance with financial instruments.

The Diocese subsequently measures all of its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost, except for investments in equity instruments that are quoted in an active market, which are measured at fair value. Changes in fair value are recognized in the *statement of revenue and expenditures and changes in fund balances*.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash and term deposits, receivables, loans receivable and mortgage receivable.

Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include bank indebtedness, accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

Financial Instruments (Continued)

Financial assets measured at fair value include marketable securities. The fair value of investments in publicly traded companies has been determined using the closing price at year end.

The Diocese removes financial liabilities, or a portion of, when the obligation is discharged, cancelled or expires.

Financial assets measured at cost are tested for impairment when there are indicators of impairment. Previously recognized impairment losses are reversed to the extent of the improvement provided the asset is not carried at an amount, at the date of reversal, greater than the amount that would have been the carrying amount had no impairment loss been recognized previously. The amounts of any write-downs or reversals are recognized in the *statement of revenue and expenditures and changes in fund balances*.

Foreign Currency Transactions

The Diocese translates all of its foreign currency transactions using the temporal method. Monetary assets and liabilities are translated at the exchange rate in effect at the statement of financial position date. Other assets and liabilities are translated at the exchange rate in effect at the transaction date. Exchange gains and losses are included in the *statement of revenue and expenditures and changes in fund balances*.

General Fund - Real Estate

Real estate consisting of Bishophurst is reflected at nominal value. No provision has been made for depreciation on buildings since the estimated value is in excess of the carrying amount.

All other real estate, except for real estate held for future development, registered in the name of the Diocese, comprising parish churches, halls, residences, and cemeteries located within the Diocese, are reflected on the financial statements of the individual parishes and boards.

Restricted Fund Balances

The Archbishop Wright Building Fund (AWBF) is an internally restricted fund to facilitate capital loans and property expenses.

The Church Workers' Transportation Fund (CWTF) is an internally restricted fund to facilitate car loans and theological education.

Special purpose funds for Local Parish and Diocesan purposes are restricted funds to support ministry and mission throughout the diocese and within local parishes.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue from donations and fundraising activities is recognized when received. All other revenue is recognized on an accrual basis.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian Accounting Standards for Not-For-Profit Organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenditures during the periods specified. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Significant areas requiring the use of estimates relate to the determination of the allowance of doubtful accounts. These estimates are reviewed periodically, and as adjustments become necessary, they are reported in earnings in the year in which they become known.

2. CASH AND TERM DEPOSITS

The Diocese holds cash balances in its restricted funds as follows: Local Parish and Diocesan purposes - \$628,759 (2023 - \$326,493), Archbishop Wright Building Fund (AWBF) - \$18,370 (2023 - \$9,900) and Church Workers' Transportation Fund (CWTF) - \$12,648 (2023 - \$648).

3. MARKETABLE SECURITIES

Marketable securities comprise investments in publicly traded companies. Dividends, interest and fees charged by the custodian and capital gains from the sale of marketable securities are allocated among the funds on a proportionate basis. 6. BANK INDEBTEDNESS

The Diocese has a credit facility with the CIBC in the amount of \$250,000, secured by a general security agreement. Interest is calculated at prime + 1.5%. As at December 31, 2024 \$0 of the facility was utilized.

7. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

The Diocese has guaranteed a mortgage held by a not-for-profit corporation to a maximum of \$42,081. In addition, the Diocese has guaranteed bank operating lines of credit for two parishes to a maximum of \$37,000 in total.

8. RESTRICTED FUNDS (CONTINUED)

The Diocese has received numerous bequests over the years since incorporation which are recorded as assets of the above funds. The use of the bequests is either internally or externally restricted. These financial statements do not provide this classification as there are many funds where the restriction is not known.

9. STIPENDS, GRANTS AND PENSIONS

Stipends, grants and pensions include \$29,309 (2023 - \$15,527) in respect of the Diocesan grants to assisted parishes. Total stipends, salaries and grants paid through the central payroll facility of the Diocese amounted to \$3,171,883 (2023 - \$3,144,940).

10. PENSION PLAN

The Diocese participates in a defined contribution plan for its employees administered by The Anglican Church of Canada. The employees contribute 5.0% of salary and the Diocese contributes 12.5% (2023 - 12.5%). The pension expense for the year amounted to \$54,234 (2023 - \$65,604).

11. FINANCIAL RISKS

Transactions in financial instruments may result in the Diocese assuming or transferring to another party one or more of the financial risks described below.

a) Credit risk

The Diocese is subject to credit risk through receivables. Credit risk is the risk that one party to a transaction will fail to discharge an obligation and cause the other party to incur a financial loss. Management has provided for any expected financial loss on the December 31, 2024 receivables, loans receivable or mortgage receivable balances.

b) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Diocese may encounter difficulty in meeting its obligations associated with its financial liabilities as they become due. It is management's opinion that the Diocese is not exposed to significant liquidity risks arising from its financial instruments.

c) Market risk

The Diocese's financial instruments expose it to market risk, in particular, other price risk which results from investing activities. Other price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk), whether those changes are caused by factors specific to the individual financial instrument or its issuer, or factors affecting all similar financial instruments traded in the market. The Diocese is exposed to other price risk through its investments quoted in an active market.

Report of the Executive Committee

The parish delegates who gather in the meeting of the sessions of the Synod once every two years set the policy of The Incorporated Synod in its work of furthering the mission and ministry of the Diocese. The Executive Committee exists to oversee the implementation of this policy and to make other policy decisions necessary to the carrying out of our Christian mission in the most effective way. The Committee routinely receives Sub-committee reports, financial reports, and parish reports. Major property transactions dealt with by the Executive can be found on pages 147-148.

The Executive Committee consists of the Archbishop, the Dean, the Archdeacons, the Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor, the Secretary-Treasurer (non-voting), the Lay Stewards from each deanery, the Regional Dean of each deanery, one lay member and one clerical member who may be appointed by the Archbishop, ACW President, Diocesan Representative on the Anglican Council of Indigenous Peoples, an Indigenous Representative (non-voting) and one elected youth delegate.

Important Decisions:

1. Property Committee Membership

Appoint Rev Peter Armstrong, Ven Joan Locke, Rev Heather Manuel, Mr Hugh Mackenzie, Colin Edwards, Canon Fran Glover and Mr Don Vardy to the property committee.

2. Honarium Policy for Worship Services

Anyone acting as an officiant for a Service in a parish to which they are not licensed shall be paid by the parish for travel at the current diocesan rate per km., out-of-pocket expenses, and an honorarium of \$200.00 minimum for the first service and an honorarium of \$75.00 minimum for each subsequent service on the same Sunday; \$75-\$100 for a midweek

service. All honorariums need to be paid through central payroll. This policy would start effective January 1, 2025.

3. Stipend and Apportionment Arrears

Parishes in arrears for their stipend and/or apportionment for over 6 months will be charged interest of prime plus 1.5% on their overdue accounts; unless and until otherwise determined by the Executive Committee.

4. Applications to the Anglican Foundation

The Anglican Foundation of Canada (AFC) accepts up to a maximum of four Category A (up to \$5,000) or Category B (up to \$15,000) applications to the core grants per year from each diocese. Alternatively, one Category C application (up to \$50,000) per calendar year may be submitted from any given diocese, however projects of this scope require consultation with AFC's Executive Director. At any single application deadline, a maximum of two applications per diocese will be considered. The Foundation holds four granting meetings annually, with application deadlines on January 1, April 1, July 1, and October 1. The Foundation also has an annual Request for Proposals funding stream each year for themed projects which do not count towards the core grant quota. The Executive is recommending that all parishes within the Diocese become annual donors to the Foundation. The minimum annual membership fee is \$100. Over the past two years the following have received Executive approval to apply to the Foundation:

- 1) Northern Lights Parish – Support the application for rectory foundation repairs
- 2) St James, Gravenhurst and the Muskoka Indigenous Friends Cultural Centre – Support the application for the “Walk With a Soft Moccasin” project.
- 3) Good Shepherd, Emsdale and Christ Church, Port Sydney – Support application to continue the “Together we Thrive” youth programming.

5. Amalgamations, Consolidations, Closures and Dissolutions

- a) Amalgamation of St Saviour's, Blind River and Church of the Redeemer, Thessalon
- b) Consolidation of the Parish of Muskoka Lakes and Trinity, Parry Sound

6. **Deanery Pastoral Worker – Sudbury- Manitoulin**

Executive authorized the Diocesan Treasurer to release necessary funds from the local trust funds (interest only) which have been previously earmarked for use in providing wages for the position of Deanery Pastoral Worker in the Deanery of Sudbury-Manitoulin.

7. **Transfer of Episcopal funds to the Anglican Foundation**

Transfer the current episcopal funds to the Anglican Foundation of Canada and that this fund be known as the Algoma Episcopal Fund.

8. **St Luke's Cathedral, Sault Ste Marie**

In the interest of seeing St Luke's Cathedral thrive as a congregation and as a Diocesan Cathedral, Executive passed a motion requesting St Luke's Cathedral to address the following matters over the coming year:

- 1) Focus on stewardship education and formation for all members of the congregation; and
- 2) Pursue a renewed and refined sense of mission and purpose as the Diocesan Cathedral as it looks to the future.

9. **Resources Required for the Disposal of Properties**

Discussions on the state of Diocesan preparedness to handle the financial realities involved with closing churches and disposing of properties.

10. **End of Companion Relationship with Tarime**

Extends its gratitude and blessing to Bishop Mwita Akiri as he retires as Bishop of Tarime: "We cherish the past years of partnership with you and the people of your Diocese. We will continue to pray for you and your ministry over the years ahead."

11. **Property Transactions**

- 1) Church of the Ascension, Sudbury – Approve an Archbishop Wright Building Loan up to \$35,000 to repair the rectory following water damage in the basement and for the flooring in the church kitchen and sanctuary.
- 2) St Luke's Cathedral, Sault Ste Marie – Authorization to enter a long-term lease of the property known as 180 Brock Street, Sault Ste Marie, and to list the property for that purpose. Approval of an Archbishop Wright Building Fund loan up to \$400,000 to facilitate the repairs needed and updates to the building and property of 180 Brock Street. Repayable over 20 years at 5% interest. Payments commence when rental income starts.

- 3) Gathering Table, Thunder Bay – Approve the demolition of the former rectory at 226 Pearl Street and that the funding up to \$164,000 be taken from funds from the sale of the former St Luke’s rectory, Thunder Bay. Approved the feasibility study to investigate the construction of a multi-use housing development on the land adjacent (226 Pearl Street, Thunder Bay) up to a total cost of \$1.3 million of grant money from the City of Thunder Bay and Partners.
- 4) Christ Church, Lively– Approve the withdrawal of \$7,000 from the capital portion of the St John’s Rectory for renovations of the Christ Church rectory.
- 5) St Mary’s Beatrice – Authorize \$75,000, to be taken from the proceeds of sales of diocesan properties not associated with a parish, for the purpose of relocating or demolishing the church.

13. **Approval of Diocesan Financial Statements and Budgets**

Approved the Diocesan Financial Statements for December 31, 2023.

Approved the Diocesan Budget for 2024 and 2025.

14. **Ending The Current Year Apportionment Adjustment**

Due to the difficulty in receiving information on a timely basis and due to the complexity of the calculation Executive approved the ending of the current year apportionment adjust and to revert to the prior method of calculating apportionment, being based on open and identifiable offerings from 2 years prior without amendment. No adjustment will be made for the 2024 apportionment.

14. **General Ratification**

Many other matters dealt with by your Executive Committee will appear in the Advisory Committee Reports. With acceptance of this Report, your Executive Committee requests ratification of all actions taken by it on your behalf since the 2023 Synod.

The committee regularly reviews the assets, liabilities, disbursements & accounts receivable, discuss financial practices and the proposed budget. Each year they, also, review stipends, travel, pensions and benefits.

There are also 6 sub-committees within A & F that undertake issues and make recommendations back to the committee. The sub-committees are:

- Compensation
- Accounting & Review
- Insurance
- Investment
- Housing (new sub-committee)
- Benefits (new sub-committee)

During this past term some of the issues discussed include:

- Budgets for 2024 and 2025
- Increase occasional travel rate to .54 per km
- Minimum stipend increases - 3% in 2024 and 3% in 2025
- Minimum travel increases – 3% in 2024 and 3% in 2025
- Two sub-committees were struck in January 2025 to explore a minimum housing allowance for the diocese and to re-evaluate all employee benefits including extended health care, dental and employee assistance programs.
- Recommendation to the Executive Committee to end the current year apportionment calculation for 2024 and beyond.

Completed Projects

1. A further five trees have been planted and all are doing well. A large maple in the front had to be removed because of deterioration. There is no plan to replace it.
2. A ride-on lawnmower was purchased, a John Deere S180 lawn tractor. This was done because the cost of lawn care had escalated to \$5,000, about the cost of the mower. It was agreed that the cost would be recovered within 2 or 3 years of use.
3. Window sills and the risers of the main staircase were painted.
4. Blinds were installed in the main bedroom, the TV room and the room above the portico – 4 blinds in total.
5. All exterior door locks were replaced as a safety issue. The front door now has keyless entry.
6. Snow removal from roof, portico and garage, winter of 2024/25

Planned Projects

1. Planning for replacement of the boilers that heat the main part of the house and the apartment. While still operating well they are nearly 30 years old.
2. Planning for painting the interior of Bishophurst. This has not been done since Bishop Andrews took residence in 2009/10. The cost will be substantial.
3. Maintenance of the front and rear steps.
4. Alarm system.
5. Maintenance of the eavestroughs and roof.
6. Renovation of the floor of the garage. Because of sagging of the floor, the door does not seal properly. There is a significant problem with squirrels and chipmunks storing food in the garage and damaging equipment and vehicles.
7. A bagging system for the lawnmower will be purchased when available.

Report of the Constitution and Canons Committee 2025

The Constitution and Canons Committee is a Diocesan committee appointed by the Archbishop.

The current members of the committee are:

I am very grateful to the committee members for their grace in dealing with a new Chair after so many years of capable leadership by Archdeacon Deborah Kraft. I have much to learn, but I am thankful for the trust placed in me by our Archbishop and for the guidance and fellowship of my fellow committee members.

The committee wishes to thank The Ven. Deborah Kraft for her many years of leadership as the Chair of the committee. Her guidance to me following her retirement from this position has been invaluable.

We also wish to thank Canon Garth O'Neill, Chancellor, for his contributions to the committee over the years. Garth remains a sounding board for me, even though he is no longer on the committee.

We have been asked to consider an amendment to **Article 3, Section 2** of the **Constitution of the Diocese of Algoma** by the Deanery of Thunder Bay North Shore.

This section deals with Lay Delegates to Synod. The purpose of the amendment would be to allow at least one Synod Delegate to be elected from each congregation. This means that individual congregations who share an incumbent would each be able to elect at least one Synod Delegate, rather than having to elect delegates as a parish.

The Deanery of Thunder Bay North Shore passed a Motion amending **Article 3, Section 2**. The Constitutions and Canons Committee reviewed that Motion and asked the Deanery of Thunder Bay North Shore to consider some changes. As a result, the attached (Appendix A) Motion was passed in October, 2024:

The existing wording of Article 3, section 2 c) provides that not more than one delegate in each parish shall be a non-resident of that parish. The term "non-

resident” can be open to interpretation and Deanery of Thunder Bay North Shore’s Motion attempts to more precisely define that term.

However, in order to maximize flexibility for congregations and following discussion at the Executive Committee, the Constitution and Canons Committee is proposing the following **amendment** to the Deanery of Thunder Bay North Shore’s Motion:

2. *number of delegates:*

- a) Every ~~separate parish~~ **congregation**, regardless of the number of its ~~congregations~~, shall be entitled to elect one lay delegate and an alternate. **In the case of the election of more than one delegate, the chair of the vestry shall sign a certificate stating the number of canonical voters and forward it to the Secretary of the Synod with the certificate of election.**
- b) If the number of its canonical voters exceeds one hundred, the ~~parish~~ **congregation** shall be entitled to two lay delegates. If the number of its canonical voters exceeds two hundred the ~~parish~~ **congregation** shall be entitled to three lay delegates.
- c) ~~Not more than one delegate in each parish shall be a non-resident of that parish.~~
- d) ~~Parishes consisting of one congregation shall elect their delegates at the annual vestry meeting next preceding the regular meeting of Synod.~~

- e) ~~In parishes consisting of more than one congregation, the parish may elect the delegate to which it is entitled in a manner in which all of the congregations agree. If the congregations do not agree, the following method shall be used:~~

~~c) In any case where there is no incumbent, the Territorial Archdeacon shall act to ensure the provisions of this Constitution are followed.~~

notification of synod office:

~~d) The incumbent and churchwardens shall forward to the Synod Office the names of the delegates elected at the annual vestry meeting within one month following that meeting.~~

nomination at any vestry:

~~e) For sufficient cause, lay delegates may be nominated and elected in the manner provided above at any vestry meeting called for the~~

purpose, provided that the provisions for the calling of a vestry meeting are followed.

Of course, it is very challenging to craft wording that meets the needs of various congregations, while not creating new challenges for the Diocese. We hope that the Amended Motion being brought forward to Synod achieves this balance.

The deanery of Thunder Bay North Shore also submitted a motion to the Canon and Constitution to make changes to Canon H-5. The Canons and Constitution chose not to take this canonical change forward to Synod for the following reasons:

- 1) The Committee felt that the proposed amendment to Article 3, Section 2 of the Constitution addresses the underlying reason for the desire to change the definition of parish by providing that in multi-point parishes each congregation may elect a delegate to Synod.
- 2) While this amendment addresses a particular model of ministry ie. “Shared ministry”, it does not take into account other ministry configurations which are emerging in the ever evolving landscape of our church eg. Regional ministries, Team ministries and Ministry hubs. The committee believes that this needs further study and exploration in the diocese and that all forms of ministry are better served through policy changes rather than canonical changes.

It will, therefore, come forward to Synod as a member’s motion.

Proposed Motion from the Parishes of West Thunder Bay and St. Thomas

April 15, 2024

Attention: Thunder Bay Deanery Council

Background

The History of Christian Ministry models has changed over the two thousand years since Jesus Christ. It started with Jesus sending disciples and followers in twos. Soon after the ascension there was a model of presbyters and deacons appointed for specific ministry in a geographic area. Presbyters became Bishops with Priests and Deacons serving under them. The term incumbent was given to a Priest serving under a Bishop. In the formation of Dioceses and Parishes the Bishop was considered Rector of all congregations within the geographic area of the Diocese. The parish was a region where the Priest was 'Incumbent' to do the ministry of the bishop in that region. Most often that term of parish meant a single congregation. We are now in the 21st Century. The model of a one congregation 'parish' with one full-time priest may not financially feasible in many situations.

The Rev. Jonathan Blanchard and the wardens of West Thunder Bay and St. Thomas wanted to capture the reality of this moment in history. The term 'Shared Ministry' was deliberate and discerned through much prayer and consultation. Multi-point parish does not capture the unique character and historic ministry of each congregation. We, the mover, and seconder, believe it is time to try a new ministry model which celebrates the individual members of the 'One Body' of Christ. It is time to examine the Canons and Constitution of the Diocese of Algoma and to consider including Shared Ministry as an acceptable ministry model.

At Diocesan Synod in 2023 the Credential Committee stated:

Since St Thomas and West Thunder Bay are under one incumbent, they are one parish by definition of the constitution of The Diocese of Algoma.

After a meeting with the Canons and Constitution Committee, it was determined that this ruling was based on the following definition of a Parish found in both the Canons and the Constitution:

Parish: a congregation or group of congregations served by an incumbent. A parish includes an assisted parish and a self-supporting parish unless otherwise stated.

From this definition, the committee has ruled that an incumbent can serve only one Parish, and therefore all Parishes for which he/she is appointed will become one Parish.

This ruling has huge implications affecting several Parishes throughout the Diocese, effective immediately. Some of these are:

- All Parishes who share an incumbent are now deemed to be a single Parish.
- If the current definition of Parish remains it will result in confusion as to how many wardens, treasurers and other officers are appointed or elected.
- The practice of appointing an interim incumbent during times when a Parish is without an incumbent, will negate the possibility of appointing an incumbent from another Parish within the Diocese.

Rationale for the Motion

Traditional churches throughout the world are faced with the challenges of declining human resources (clergy), declining church attendance, and financial pressures. The future ability to keep our doors open for worship needs new and innovative solutions.

We believe that a path forward to sustain our ability to spread the gospel, and to solve the problems created by this ruling, can be obtained through the concept of Shared Ministry.

A Shared Ministry covenant was created between the Parish of West Thunder Bay and the Parish of St. Thomas (Thunder Bay) and endorsed by the Diocese and the Archbishop.

In a letter, dated February 14, 2021, the Archbishop states:

The result of all these meetings, in which the presence and guidance of the Holy Spirit has been evident, has been the collective discernment that St. Thomas's and West Thunder Bay will enter into a new time with the Rev. Jonathan Blanchard assuming the incumbency for both parishes.

...

This new ministry will begin on April 1st when the present Incumbent of St. Thomas, the Rev. Jonathan Blanchard, will begin a shared ministry between St. Thomas and West Thunder Bay, with each parish contributing 50% towards his stipend, rectory expenses and travel allowance.

...

I have requested that a Covenant of Shared Ministry be drawn up between the three congregations so that there is a common understanding about the arrangements and how you will live together as communities of beloved disciples Jesus.

The present Constitution and Canons do not define Shared Ministry. By adding its definition to Canon H5: ESTABLISHMENT AND DISSOLUTION OF CONGREGATIONS AND PARISHES, we believe that the problems created by the recent ruling will be solved, and a path forward will be established to address the challenges for those parishes faced with declining resources.

At the meeting with the Canons and Constitution Committee, we were instructed to propose changes to the Constitution and/or Canons to remedy the problems created by their ruling. They recommended that we bring these proposed changes forward to our Deanery Council.

Therefore, we are proposing the following Motion to refer changes to Canon of the Diocese of Algoma to Diocesan Synod:

Motion

Moved by: Jim Naida, Warden, St. Mark's, West Thunder Bay

Seconded by: Dale Willis, Warden, St. Thomas (Thunder Bay)

Be it resolved that the Thunder Bay-North Shore Deanery Council refer the following to the next regular meeting of Diocesan Synod for consideration:

Add the following definition of Shared Ministry to Canon H-5: ESTABLISHMENT AND DISSOLUTION OF CONGREGATIONS AND PARISHES.

Shared Ministry: Shared ministry is a ministry model where two or more parishes enter into an arrangement which includes the sharing of the Incumbent(s). The details of the Shared Ministry are specified in a Covenant of Shared Ministry that ensures a common understanding about the arrangements. The parishes retain their identity as separate parishes with separate administrations; they are not consolidated into a single parish. This allows each parish to continue its unique ministry to the local community and wider church.

And,

Amend Canon H-5: ESTABLISHMENT AND DISSOLUTION OF CONGREGATIONS AND PARISHES paragraph 3 to read:

As has been the custom of the Diocese since the formation of the Synod, the Bishop may divide a parish into two or more new parishes, bring two or more parishes together in a Shared Ministry, consolidate two or more parishes into a single new parish, transfer a congregation between parishes, or transfer one or more congregations from a dissolved parish to another parish or parishes, after consultation with the Executive Committee, and appoint such new Incumbent or Incumbents as the Bishop finds appropriate in conformity with ~~the applicable~~ Canon I-1 ~~on a~~Appointments to Charges.

The Postulancy Commission

The Postulancy Commission advises the Bishop on matters concerning the discernment of vocations to ordained ministry in our Diocese. The Commission is part of a larger process of discernment that includes support from the local congregation, involvement with a Pastoral Chaplain, feedback from the educational institution/formation program of the aspirant or postulant and, in most instances for those discerning a call to the presbyterate (ordained priesthood), assessment by the Advisory Committee on Postulants for Ordination (ACPO), which provides evaluation by assessors from beyond the Diocese.

The Commission holds both in-person (Sudbury or North Bay) and online meetings (using the Zoom platform). With the exception of Fall 2024, meetings continued to be scheduled on a more frequent basis than in past years. The commission devotes a portion of its time for ongoing education and formation related to its work. For example, in order to reflect and learn more about discerning diaconal vocations, last year commission members met with The Rev. Maylanne Maybee, a long-time deacon, educator, and author, and a contributor to The Anglican Church of Canada's *Iona Report: The Diaconate in The Anglican Church of Canada (2016)*. Likewise, periodically I send out articles or other resources to better equip commission members in their work of vocational discernment. We continue to identify concrete steps for improving the discernment and formational processes in our Diocese.

At the time of writing, there are two postulants (both presbyteral track) and fourteen aspirants (seven presbyteral track, seven diaconal track) at various points in the overall postulancy process.

I ask congregations to pray regularly for the Postulancy Commission and all who are discerning a possible ministry in Holy Orders. Pray, too, that God will raise up in Algoma passionate, visionary, and gifted vocations for ordained leadership.

Report on Provincial Synod to Executive Council November 2024

This report is a compilation of mini-reports submitted by Algoma Delegates to Provincial Synod (September 24-26, 2024). It was held at Bawating (the place of the rapids [Ojibway]) we call it Sault Ste. Marie,

Here are Youth Delegate, Hollie Davis', general impressions of our time together:

It was very long, but overall ok. It was good getting to meet other youth. I got to hang out with people from Algoma I don't get to see often. It was good getting to know some new people. Some of the discussions and speakers were really great. Regarding Shingwauk: It was a beautiful location but it was hard to hear and read the stories. It was difficult going to the cemetery and placing tobacco. The chapel was beautiful even though the children were forced to work on it.

On our first morning together, following our opening Eucharist and Business Necessary to Constitute Synod, we received the Metropolitan's Charge. Alicia Sandham reflects:

In Archbishop Anne's Charge to Provincial Synod, much like the Charge she presents to Diocesan Synod, she spoke on our first full day (Tuesday) about the theme for Synod, as well as touching briefly on the plans for the week such as the visit to Shingwauk the following day. Our theme for Provincial Synod 2024 was "Conversations at the Crossroads", inspired by Jeremiah 6:16 -

*"Stand at the crossroads and look,
and ask for the ancient paths,
where the good way lies; and walk in it,
and find rest for your souls."*

Archbishop Anne spoke about the pains our world is experiencing, in nature and in humankind, between climate change and violence and everything in-between. She wondered if perhaps it might seem folly to meet and converse on the future of the church and if it might feel like we sit idly by if we consider ourselves while others struggle so much. But she reminded us, then, that there is hope, and we must focus on that. She invited us to consider at least these three reasons why us meeting in Synods and worship was, in fact, not folly: first, because we have a focus on God's work, remembering what He has already done for us and therefore giving us hope for the future, and we proved this by beginning our Synod with a celebration of the Eucharist; second, because what we are invited to do is not just meet and talk, but to go forth and do work afterwards, and it is not our work alone, together or individually, but in fact God's work, for the whole of Creation; third, it is established directly in the verse from the Prophet Jeremiah who inspired our Synod theme, and from the rest of Jeremiah's book, a book that was rather topically written about endings, new beginnings, and times of trial, that we ought to continue to examine God's past work and allow ourselves to be the ones that walk forward in what follows.

Archbishop Anne reminded us that though there may be events or discussions that have potential to divide individuals from each other or the church from itself, we still have not just a responsibility but a privilege to be the ones that are called to such an important mission that it is meant for the entire world to hear. When we consider circumstances and topics such as reconciliation, discrimination, war, politics, or anything that may "hit close to home"; when we consider safety and creating welcoming environments; when we consider land matters and nitty-gritty finances; we also need to consider the path that Jesus creates for us, and the ways in which we are meant to walk. The message that we can take from Archbishop Anne's charge

and from every moment of Provincial Synod was to realize that the way in which we are meant to walk Christ's path is "together".

Following the Metropolitan's Charge were the results of the elections of Prolocutor and Metropolitan. Both were acclaimed by almost unanimous ballots – Laura Walton and Archbishop Anne Germond.

We had meaningful worship time together as reported by Archdeacon Kelly Baetz:

Worship at Provincial Synod was ably organized and led by Dean Jay and Rev. Norm Blanchard (and likely others who worked behind the scenes!). Members of Synod took turns with readings and canting the Psalms, and the singing and hearty "amens" from the entire assembly added to the richness of the whole experience. The liturgies wove the Synod theme and so many of our conversations together, enabling us to offer all our work and all our hopes up to God. We were particularly blessed by the presence and leadership of our National Indigenous Archbishop, The Rt. Rev. Chris Harper, and by a special Taize service on the evening we returned from visiting the Shingwauk discovery centre. Everything about the worship at Provincial Synod was infused with that value of excellence and of humbly offering our very best to God. It was not "an extra" - it was integral to the work of Provincial Synod.

Over the past three years, the Council of Provincial Synod have done what Archbishop Anne has described as our work, that of developing a process for Vocations and Formation. The Rev'd Susan Montague-Koyle reports:

Bishop Susan Bell and Archbishop Colin Johnson presented the process, progress, and continuing steps that came out of three meetings addressing the topic: "Calling and Forming Tomorrow's Priests: Pathways to Partnership". These meetings, aimed at exploring and addressing – among other points – changing demographics and the decrease in numbers entering vocational ministries, were attended by 34 bishops, diocesan administrative officers, and deans or designates of the theological colleges representing every diocese and college in Ontario (The first gathering was also attended by three Lutheran partners). In seeking to establish a collaborative partnership between diocesan bishops, dioceses, and theological colleges that would ameliorate the issues, there were three subtopics within the broader issue that were discussed: Discipleship and Vocational Discernment; Intensive/Accelerated Education and Formation; and Lifelong Learning & Vocational Development. From these discussions, five areas for immediate action were discerned (Structural integrations/governance; Incubators; Vocations; conference; Mentorship; and Lifelong Learning). Vocations and the forming of priests was established as the priority for the next three years. This includes more exploration of "incubator" people and parishes and the development of fruitful mentorship arrangements in each diocese. To this end, each diocese in the Ecclesiastical Province of Ontario was asked to present a brief report at Provincial Synod that would provide a snapshot of the current practices/structures in place to encourage/support various ministries as well as share knowledge and experience that would benefit the other dioceses. The following questions were to be addressed at the parish level: 1. What are you doing to promote lay and ordained leadership in your parishes? How are you providing pathways of discernment in your parish? How do you connect potential leaders to diocesan structures and what can they expect in terms of diocesan discernment, support and development of ministry skills? What can we learn from your experience in raising up and forming leaders that would help the whole province? It was clear throughout the presentations

that each diocese has processes in place for raising up and supporting various ministries but some are much more formal than others. Different priorities, ex. Education/training or raising up/supporting deacons, have clearly been established in each diocese. Mentorship (or lack thereof) seemed to be consistently put forward as a need to be addressed.

Finally, Bishop Susan Bell facilitated a panel discussion that brought in The Rev. Dr. Christopher C. Brittain, Dean of Divinity at Trinity College Toronto and Stephen Chester, Lord and Lady Coggan Professor of New Testament at Wycliffe College Toronto. It was readily apparent that the theological colleges have undergone significant changes – particularly after navigating the COVID pandemic – but are adapting course delivery, programme courses, and programme requirements to obtain success in managing the changes. There is great willingness to partner with dioceses to strategize collaboratively to promote viable theological education options to increased vocational aspirants.

Additionally, we were given a presentation regarding the Primate's Commission respecting the future of our Church. Pippa Howard gives the following reflection:

The report provided an overview of the role of the Primates Commission within the Anglican Church of Canada. Focus was given to “the 3 C’s”; Connect, Convene, Communicate. The Commission strives to foster these actions within the Church, to allow for growth. How can the Church flourish and continue to proclaim the Gospel in the 21st Century? The commission has come up with 7 Hypothesis which they want Anglicans across Canada to consider and provide feedback on for discussion at General Synod 2025. The Hypotheses are listed at the end of this report, along with a link to additional information about them. After a presentation of these hypotheses, each table was given time to engage in a discussion; we were asked if we felt any one of the hypotheses was more important than others and if there were any we felt could be eliminated. At the end of the discussion period, each table provided their notes and comments to the representatives to be collated as part of their review of how these concepts may play a part in the future of the Anglican church in Canada. The Hypotheses will continue to be discussed over the next months leading up to General Synod in June 2025 and, to assist in this, a survey on the Hypotheses will be available through November 2025 for all members of the church to complete. During the question period after the presentation, it was asked why there was no representation on the Commission from the Indigenous community; it was pointed out that the Sacred Circle is an integral part of the church in our nation and, given that Hypothesis #1 speaks directly to that fact, it would seem that there should be an Indigenous member on the Commission. This led to a motion being made and passed that the Primates Commission shall include at least one representative from Sacred Circle.

Hypotheses: Reimagining the Church

- 1) It is time to dismantle the colonial foundations of the Council of the North to fully “embrace mutual interdependence with the Indigenous church” (Sacred Circle).*
- 2) It is time to dismantle the racism and colonialism that are built into our governance structures in order to diversify participation.*
- 3) It is time to eliminate one level of structure—either General Synod or the Ecclesiastical Provinces.*

- 4) *It is time to examine returning to a model where the Primate is also a diocesan bishop.*
- 5) *It is time to (further) reduce travel and meeting costs, for both financial and environmental reasons.*
- 6) *It is time to re-vision Church House.*
- 7) *It is time to end independent editorial journalism funded by General Synod.*

Behind the Hypotheses

There were a number of visitors at Provincial Synod. Alison Wier says:

Our guests, with their abundance of knowledge and great sense of humour, contributed much to all aspects of synod. They provided a wealth of information and gave us much to think about. They represented programs that are making a difference in our local churches, Canada and the world. Their information sharing, conversations and pastoral care were a huge support to all of the delegates who attended Provincial Synod. Their ministries challenged us all. Our synod was that much richer because of their contributions.

Pathways to Partnership

The Archbishop of York had a significant impact on our gathering as reported by The Rev'd Nancy Ringham who also shares some of her impressions of Provincial Synod:

First off, I am a first time attendee at Provincial Synod after twenty years of priestly ministry. My overall impression was how much deep, difficult wrestling of issues and priorities takes place around the Provincial Synod table, both in person as we were in September, and when the Executive meets in between Provincial Synod gatherings. I was so privileged to be present at the same time as Archbishop of York Stephen Cottrell was the honoured guest, visiting speaker and preacher at our final Eucharist.

His words for the church in this time, "Be Simple, Be Humble, Be Bold" have continued to rumble around in me and I have heard them repeated by others who were in person September 24-26, in SSM. Archbishop Cottrell embodied those words both in his casual interactions with members of Synod, and as he addressed us in his evening talks. As much as this man advises King Charles III as a member of the Privy Council, his demeanor among us spoke truth with grace and humour and compelled us to be bold and go and do the same. I loved how he shared ample time with the youngest of our delegates and was approachable and sincere in all the encounters I witnessed and experienced. His proclamation of the gospel was heard in his words and seen in his actions throughout the gathering. It was most moving to hear his confession on behalf of the Church of England, about coming to terms with the involvement through history of the church and their implication in human slave trade. We have our own unique history of the treatment of indigenous children as is well known, and his posture guided us all to be in the right spirit to visit the Shingwauk Discovery Centre and the Chapel, cemetery and former Residential School. I can say that I was changed by this afternoon, and I believe others were as well. Archbishop Cottrell's contrite heart assisted in shaping our experience as other leaders did, while we were present on that land. Another phrase of the Archbishop's stays with me, as I close, "We cannot write the terms of our penance." I am encouraged and humbled by this phrase, to continue to journey seeking understanding through listening and silence, believing that reconciliation is my hope filled outcome. These words of Archbishop Cottrell are on my heart to this end.

Report to Synod 2025

In response to the charge to Synod 2022 by Archbishop Anne Germond, members of the Diocese of Algoma Social Justice Committee made presentations to deaneries about homelessness. In these presentations, particular attention was paid to the statistical increase in homelessness in each location. Emphasis was placed on addressing misconceptions about homelessness.

A successful Homelessness Week was held during the first week of May of 2024. Our special focus was an effective Webinar and services for Homelessness Sunday. A striking poster for Homelessness Week was circulated to parishes to spark interest. Ideas for projects, advocacy and services were posted on the Diocesan Website.

Parishes were challenged to initiate projects which might address issues of homelessness, housing insecurity and food insecurity. Many parishes reported back on initiatives begun or already in process. These included: community gardens, community meals and feeding programs, distribution of warm bedding and clothing, food banks and a winter community pantry, participation in 'Out of the Cold' programs, and strikingly affordable housing projects in three locations across the Diocese: Thunder Bay, Sault Saint Marie and Baysville (Muskoka).

Since November of 2024 the committee has begun visioning and planning for participation at the Diocesan Synod 2025 and holding Homelessness Week in October of 2025 to correspond with World Homeless Day which is Friday October 10, 2025. We are tentatively planning for Oct 5 -12, 2025 for this emphasis across the diocese.

Following a meeting with Archbishop Anne Germond in early March of 2025, the committee has broadened its vision to include issues of food insecurity. This will be reflected in our Synod 2025 initiatives.

The committee is appreciative of the tireless work of Dr. Jane Cox, who has resigned from the group to focus on her work with new immigrants.

We thank Archbishop Anne and the executive committee for their support of our efforts to keep social justice in the hearts and minds of Anglicans in Algoma

Anglican Fellowship of Prayer Report to Algoma Synod 2025

“Prayer is an interesting thing. We pray not so much to change the mind of God, but to change ourselves to God’s mind.” —Excerpt from “We Believe: The Nicene Creed...”, a reflection for the 2025 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

The Anglican Fellowship of Prayer serves as a resource for dioceses parishes, and individuals to develop their life of prayer both when praying alone and as the Body of Christ praying together.

Their website “anglicanprayer.org” offers a host of resources. A catalogue of materials on many different ways to pray that can be printed out to use as individuals and in parish gatherings. Videos posted there are useful for workshops in your parishes. A recent addition in the past year is a recorded series “Prayer Among Friends” by the much-loved priest Herbie O’Driscoll who contributed much to the life of the church during his long life and ministry. There is also a way to send in prayer requests that will be prayed for by the AFP praying team.

“Let Us Pray” zoom gatherings continue to be offered the 3rd Monday of each month from 1-2 pm. People from around the country are invited to share about prayer in their various contexts and the recordings of these are also available on the website. Recent topics have been a 3 part series on *Developing a Rule of Life* by a sister, oblate, and associate of the Sisters of St John the Divine in Toronto, *Medieval Mystics* with Archbishop Lynne McNaughton from Kootenay, and *Prayer in the Life of Migrant Workers* with the Rev Enrique Martinez from Huron Diocese. Check the website for upcoming speakers among whom are bishops William Cliff and Rachel Parker. There is a recoding of Archbishop Anne teaching about *Praying With Icons* from a while back.

The AFP quarterly newsletter continues to be posted on the website, with a message from national director Archdeacon Paul Feheley, short articles, prayers, and book reviews. A few hard copies are mailed out.

As I write this the end of January, the national executive is working on 3 new major projects. As you read this, some will have been completed, and others will be in process, or still to occur.

April 5... Dean Richard Sewell of St George’s College in Jerusalem will lead a national Lenten Quiet Day by zoom titled ‘Walking The Way of Jesus: From Jerusalem to your Home’.

March 17... The Very Reverend Robert Key, International Director of the *Thy Kingdom Come* programme speaks on Let Us Pray by zoom from England. *TKC* is a global ecumenical movement that invites Christians around the world to pray from Ascension to Pentecost for more people to come to know Jesus. AFP will be the major promoter of this for Canada as it occurs May 29-June 8.

February through June the AFP executive is developing ways of providing pray support for General Synod which will be held in London June 23-29, particularly around the election of our next Primate.

In Algoma: It is a privilege to continue serving as your diocesan contact, to serve on the national executive, and to be available to help you individually or in your parish with anything related to developing your prayer life. I continue to make prayer plaques for confirmands and those being received into the Anglican Communion, to give a gift of an Orthodox Prayer Bracelet to new deacons, and a book on prayer to new priests. For the recent Provincial Synod I

composed prayers that followed the proceedings of each day and organized each diocese to take a turn praying on a particular day. A similar plan of organizing our deaneries to pray during this upcoming diocesan synod is in the planning stages.

Anglican Foundation of Canada report to the Diocese of Algoma Synod- May 2025

As many of you are aware, the Anglican Foundation of Canada (AFC) has been in operation for over 65 years, helping dioceses, parishes and individuals from sea to sea to sea.

The Mission Statement of the AFC states that the Anglican Foundation of Canada supports ministries of the Anglican Church throughout Canada by enabling connections, fostering innovations, stewarding resources and connecting generous donors to their philanthropic goals.

Our plan is based on AFC values of faith, innovation, generosity, trust and inclusivity.

2024 was the fourth year in a row where over one million dollars was dispersed from sea to sea to sea. The grant program covers the five main areas-35% to Diverse Infrastructure, 30% to Community Ministries, 20% to Leadership and Education, 10% to Indigenous Ministries and 5% to Sacred Music and Liturgical Arts.

The connections between the AFC and Anglicans across Canada are growing stronger. For the first time, in the history of AFC, grants or loans were given to projects in all 30 Dioceses in Canada. Since 2010, the Diocese of Algoma has received \$371,053.16 from the AFC.

For the 4th year, the "Say Yes To Kids " campaign was held and raised \$130,000 for youth related programs. The 3 youth camps in Algoma formed a team to raise money for their bursary funds. Camp Gitchigomee, Camp Manitow and Camp Temiskaming raised close to \$10,000. Each camp received just under \$2,000 for their bursary funds with the remaining dollars going to the AFC youth fund.

As well, June 2nd was declared by the Canadian Bishops to be Youth Sunday. Special prayers and other materials were written by AFC for all Anglican churches to use. The churches were encouraged to include young people in the service as ushers, readers and servers.

Since the 2023 Synod I have presented both written and spoken reports to the five Deaneries in Algoma at their meetings. I also provided a yearly update in January to the Regional Deans which they could distribute to the churches in their area for the Vestry Reports. As well, I have had the opportunity to meet with the Anglican Church Women at their yearly meetings in May up-date them on the activities of AFC.

Dr. Scott Brubacher, Executive Director of AFC, has said, "Remember behind each grant or loan is a generous giver". We need to 'Imagine More' and with God's help, to give and to support our fellow Anglicans in all 30 Dioceses.

Report to the 2025 Synod of the Diocese of Algoma

Since Synod met last, the Mission has been incredibly busy. 2024 was our busiest year since 2000, 2023 our second busiest, in large part due to shipping potash. 2025 is expected to continue this level of activity.

In 2024, we ministered to the seafarers from ocean-going ships, which included working with 148 ships and transporting 1,938 seafarers. The Seafarers' Centre at Keefer Terminal was staffed by a Driver/Watch Keeper on 201 evenings with 223 sailors visiting.

Our Christmas Gift Bags are an important part of our ministry, and we appreciate everyone who knitted toques and mitts and donated to our gift bags from across the Diocese. Any donations must be received by the 2nd last Monday in November. 434 bags, including 5 for women, were delivered to 22 ships.

In terms of volunteers, we are modifying our practise; instead of a team of Watch Keeper and Driver on for a shift, we have moved to a single Driver/Watch Keeper with a second person when required. Ships now have Wi-Fi, so seafarers no longer have to come to the Seafarers' Centre to contact their family. Transportation is greatly valued as Thunder Bay's geography is huge; it takes 2 hours to drive the port.

We give thanks for the 31 volunteers who minister to the seafarers and assist with fund-raising and governance, representing Thunder Bay Anglican parishes, Baptist, Roman Catholic, Evangelical Lutheran congregations and no religious affiliation. 11 are Driver/Watch Keepers, 18 put the Christmas Gift Bags together, and others assisted with managing the finances, fund-raising and overseeing the Mission on the Board of Directors. Our Volunteer Appreciation Social was well attended, with about 25 people present. In order to keep our pool of volunteers healthy we are looking for 3 new Driver/Watch Keepers each year.

We are still looking for a Treasurer. Canon Ed has been the acting Treasurer since March 2023. Several volunteers are helping with deposits, bookkeeping, and processing donations. The accounts are up-to-date, and a manual has been written to assist the bookkeepers.

The Blessing of the Fleet was held on June 22, 2024 at Prince Arthur's Landing Marina, and it is scheduled for June 28 this year.

With respect to public relations and fund-raising, our website was redeveloped and launched last fall with a new domain name. Canon Ed produced 2 videos, which are posted on the website.

Looking ahead to 2025, the port will be busy and we will need to raise up some more Driver/Watch Keepers. Canon Ed is part-time as chaplain and has responsibilities for St. Stephen the Martyr, so he has a limit on the amount of work he can do for the Mission. The Seafarers' Centre is a house trailer and the blocking and skirt need to be replaced. While we have the funds to do this, if we do not raise additional funds, it will seriously deplete our reserves.

We give thanks for the Thunder Bay Port Authority, Diocese of Algoma, International Seafarers' Society of Canada (ISSC), individuals, churches, ACW groups, and maritime businesses that support us financially.

CAMP GITCHIGOMEE REPORT TO SYNOD 2025

The Camp Gitchigomee Board of Directors was pleased to receive an invitation to report to the 2025 Synod of the Anglican Diocese of Algoma. The report is a snapshot of what has transpired since our last report to the 2023 Synod. Camp Gitchigomee was unable to offer children's camps in 2020, 2021 and 2022 due to Covid-19 challenges. We re-opened in 2023 with quite low camper numbers, but rebounded in 2024 with more campers than pre-covid. ☺ It was so great to hear laughter during swim times, singing around the campfire, and the camp humming with all kinds of activities, like crafts, chapel, meals (and doing dishes, of course), Bible study, archery, canoeing, games and skits.



We are so thankful for the support we receive from the TB – NS Deanery churches and beyond. This includes EOP donors, leadership from parish priests and good old roll up-the-sleeves help. In addition, the camp received very generous monetary donations in 2023 and 2024 from the Salvation Army for camper bursaries. And last fall, we received a gift of \$10K from the Thunder Bay Community Foundation (thanks to Archdeacon Kraft) to go towards the purchase of a new generator to power the camp.

From camp opening in early May to shut-down in October, the camp site has been quite active with work days, children's camps and rentals. We have a faithful crew that has been taking care of usual maintenance items like cutting the grass, testing smoke detectors, changing the generator oil, installing the water systems, raking the beach, levelling buildings, painting and fixing a myriad of things. This crew has also tackled some upgrades like installing new doors and exhaust fans in the camper cabins and ramps at entrances. New siding and windows are on the list for 2025.

It remains our hope and prayer that all campers experience the love of God at the camp. Whether it is from a kind word from a leader; the chapel or campfire experiences; a Bible verse; passive faith symbols like the cross on the Dining hall and the Beloved sign behind the campfire stage; the graces we sing before each meal; the wonder of creation and good clean fun, or all of the above. After each camp, all campers receive a memento “log”, which is a small dowel painted with a symbol of the camp attended. The dowel has holes drilled in each end, and string threaded through them, so that it may be worn around the neck. Some staff have a very long string of logs!



Behind the scenes, we held regular monthly meetings to plan, organize and prepare for the next season and the next camp event, whether it was the two bit auction fundraiser, a Gitchi-Gathering at Gathering Table, the appreciation supper, staff training and of course, the three weeks of children’s camps. One other thing we did was to prepare for our 2023 accreditation visit with a representative from the Ontario Camps Association. Yes, we remain accredited! And we remain in good standing with the Pro-Kids initiative with the City of Thunder Bay so that together, we enable children to attend camp.

Outside the scheduled camper weeks, we have rented the camp out to many groups and families which not only provides a source of income, but is also good exposure of the camp itself. There have been many family gatherings, two parish retreats, several family reunions and a wedding on the beach (the groom and best man got wet just before the ceremony, but that is another story!). Last August, Archbishop Anne visited the camp during a rental to the TB Muslim Association – who very graciously welcomed her. Confederation College has also rented the camp where part of their Environmental Technician Field School is held. Last August, there was a retreat for young candidates wishing to be confirmed. It was great. This coming summer, there is the possibility of a Youth retreat at the camp, and we will be planning to celebrate our 80th anniversary.

The camp is not without challenges, of course. Costs continue to rise for all things - particularly insurance, and recruiting some cabin leaders and waterfront staff seems to be an annual thing. We hope to mentor some younger folks in active and/or leadership roles, as some of us are getting grey! So we would appreciate your prayers, and if so inclined, financial contributions as well (EOP is great).



Again, our heartfelt thanks to all who help with this ministry.

Camp Manitou Report to Diocese of Algoma Synod May 2025

Post-Covid, we had mostly full youth camps for 2023 and 2024. We did have good and enough staff for each camp with a little shortage of counselors, aged 17 plus for our youth camps. All 4 family camps in both the summers were also well attended.

As always the Nature Camp was very well attended. Each summer had good attendance for opening, closing and work camps. The final financial results for the year 2024 showed a healthy bank balance in the black.

Our water system was approved again along with camp kitchen and building safety this year from Public Health and the Ministry of the Environment. Each Camp Manager was certified to do water testing and there were two approved water testing results from a local laboratory. You may be aware that the Camp's water comes from the Bay of Islands lake water (which is part of the North Channel waters between Whitefish Falls and Manitoulin Island).

We have had a number of donations to help with projects the Board wanted and wants to complete in the next few years. This includes a \$100,000 capital fund raising effort to make repairs to Voyageur House. This building is approximately 100 years old and needs a lot of repairs to make it safe. One of the people (Sebastian Diebel) very involved in Camp for many years, including being a member of the Board until 2023, is the current chair of the capital campaign and has hosted a Town Hall meeting MARCH 12, 2025 via ZOOM. Since there are many of you reading this report who may be interested in the this project (which might include an option to demolish), or in making a donation here is Sebastian's email:

We encourage churches to donate to the camp especially for our Bursary Program set aside for those children whose families cannot afford a full camp fee. We are looking forward to another successful camping season from the end of June to the beginning of September 2025. The summer of 2024 was another successful one for Camp Temiskaming. Two children's camps, as well as a Men's weekend and a Women's weekend were held. Other groups, such as Brownies Guides and churches enjoyed our beautiful camp.

In an effort to provide more widespread information about the Camp, a focused Facebook campaign was put in place. This promotion resulted in a 'wait list' for the Junior Camp. We were able to accommodate 24 campers and 4 counselors at the Junior level (ages 8 to 11) and 17 campers and 4 counselors at the Senior week (12 to 15 years).

In anticipation of this increased demand, three camps are scheduled for the summer of 2025— Junior and Senior weeks in July (13-19 and 20-26 respectively) and a second week for Juniors in August (10-16). Adult Volunteers are needed to help during these weeks. Please pray about whether this is a place you are called to serve. Please contact our website below to volunteer.

The children enjoy many activities, such as swimming, kayaking, canoeing, hiking, singing, crafts, Chaplain's chat, archery, games, campfires, spider dogs and s'mores, and of course – tuck!

During the spring of 2024, Camp Temiskaming joined with the other two camps in the Diocese of Algoma to field a "Say Yes To Kids" fund raising team with the Anglican Foundation of Canada. The 3 teams raised nearly \$10,000. Each camp received just under \$2,000 for their bursary funds with a share also going to fund AFC Youth programs.

Camp Temiskaming is located on Fairy Lake, just west of New Liskeard. Our plant includes cabins with bunk beds, a pavilion for crafts and singsongs etc., a dining hall with a completely renovated kitchen, a wash house with showers, toilets and wash basins as well as a waterfront shed for life vests, paddles and other safety equipment related to the kayaks, canoes and swimming.

Bliss Gillmor Board Report Synod 2025

Thank you for this opportunity to present to you an update on Bliss Gillmor Housing Complex.

For those not familiar with Bliss Gillmor, Bliss Gillmor is a non-profit housing complex on the property of St. John the Divine on Main Street in downtown North Bay. For over twenty- five years Bliss Gillmor has provided access to affordable housing for the residents of North Bay and the Board remains committed to offering affordable housing. Bliss Gillmor has thirteen subsidized units. As we are all aware affordable housing is also an important contributor to Poverty Reduction.

The Board in 2015 developed an agreement with CMHA (Canadian Mental Health Association) where CMHA will have first opportunity to place one of their clients in an available unit. We have placed eleven tenants from CMHA and they have been a wonderful addition. A member of CMHA attends our monthly meetings so there is a strong liaison between Bliss Gillmor and CMHA.

We have employed a part-time superintendent who does the cleaning and minor repairs; a book keeper who does detailed book keeping and a contract with Northland Fire Prevention to ensure fire safety is in place. Other tenant issues are handled by Board members.

We have employed the legal services of Ramsey Law, Sophia Beaulac, to review our Bylaws and ensure that we are meeting the new government requirements re non-profit. We have had no major repairs over the past year and hopefully this will continue. (see attached financial report)

The tenants are so appreciative of their apartments, often saying, “this is beautiful” when we show them their unit, which indicates to how scarce a reasonable home is for some of our most vulnerable neighbours in need. Several of the tenants come to Open Arms (a community dinner St. John’s serves on Wednesday evening), all sitting at the same table enjoying fellowship. It is wonderful to see community developing within the complex.

We thank you for your prayers over the past years and ask for continued prayer so we can continue to do His work in downtown North Bay.





WILLIAM McMURRAY CORPORATION

(A Not for Profit Corporation)

The **WILLIAM McMURRAY CORPORATION** is a non-profit housing project established in 1980, sponsored by the Diocese and St Luke's Cathedral. It owns and operates a three-storied, elevator serviced, 18 unit apartment building that is located in downtown Sault Ste Marie. The building also houses the offices of the Diocese of Algoma.

The Board of Directors of the McMurray Corporation, at the time of writing, is comprised of Diocesan Clergy and lay members of St. Luke's Cathedral. Namely, The Venerable Hugh Hamilton (President), Richard Webb (Chair), David Tyrrel (Treasurer), Joanne Atkinson (Secretary) and Dean Emeritus James McShane, Penny Tyrrel, Fraser Dunn and Murdoch Carter (members at large). The Corporation is mortgage and debt free save for a ten-year interest free loan of \$60,000 from the Sault Ste Marie Housing Authority, taken out in September 2016 for the refurbishment of the building's elevator. Inflation, a vandalization of the entrance foyer and a bedbug infestation have eroded our annual income to a loss in the last financial year. Also \$16,833 was taken from reserves to pay for the Corporation's share of the parking lot repaving. We are still financially sound and now have a Reserve Fund, for future capital work, in excess of \$40,000. Rents are increased annually to the maximum that is permitted this year it is 2.5%. We also have 5 tenants who are on grandfathered subsidies. This situation is expected to be temporary and will gradually improve as tenant turnover occurs. Tenant turnover, however, is generally low and presently all 18 apartments are occupied. We do maintain a waiting list for anyone who may be interested in applying for accommodation. We offer 14 one-bedroom and 4 two-bedroom apartments at a rent of 80% of the actual market rate for new leases.

The building is in good repair with the following maintenance and capital projects being completed since the last report: Painting of stairs and Stairwells, repaving of the McMurray Building portion of the parking lot and replacement of stoves, refrigerators and water heaters on a planned schedule as our income permits. The apartments are renovated when the tenancy changes. In August 2019 management of the building was taken over by Regent Property Group. We continue have an excellent working relationship with Regent Property Group and it has proved to be a cost-effective decision.

1. Basis of accounting

The basis of accounting applied in the preparation of the financial information is on the historical cost basis, reflecting cash transactions, with the addition of:

- rent receivable based on lease terms less an allowance for doubtful accounts
- prepaid's

Report to the Synod of the Diocese of Algoma, May 2023 Thorneloe University

Since its establishment in 1961, Thorneloe University and the Diocese of Algoma have shared deep ties with one another. It was created by the Provincial Legislature at the bequest of an Archbishop of Algoma and Metropolitan of Ontario, William Wright. It is named after an earlier Archbishop of Algoma and Metropolitan of Ontario, George Thorneloe. While our students and teachers come from across Canada and around the world, significant numbers of students come from within the Diocese of Algoma.

The centres of activity at Thorneloe are the Ernie Checkeris Theatre, our residence, and the School of Theology. The Theatre has become home to a number of live arts ensembles in Sudbury. Our 58-room Residence supports a unique and vibrant student community on the Laurentian campus.

In order to make better use of the University's facilities, we are exploring possibilities of renting out classroom and office space. At its recent meeting, the Board of Governors approved renovations for the washrooms upstairs and other needed renovations to our building in order to facilitate this.

A Presidential Job Search is underway at Thorneloe. Stacy Allarie-Sathseevan has ably steered Thorneloe over the past year as we adjust to life after defederation with Laurentian University, and sought to build anew relationship with our neighbour. Stacy is nearing the end of her one year contract and will soon move back to her position at Laurentian, still continuing with her role as Dean of Residence. Stacy has indicated that should the process take longer than June 1st, she will continue as acting President until such a time that the new President is able to commence the role. We are grateful for Stacy's work coming in as acting President during a time of turbulence.

In the School of Theology, plans are well underway to ensure that we are well prepared for the 2025/2026 academic year, including not only securing the return of current faculty, but also the addition of some new instructors as well.

I have been consulting with students, faculty, and bishops and other diocesan representatives regarding curriculum updates and revisions that may better serve the formation and training needs of students. Of particular promise is the relationship being developed with the Diocese of Nova Scotia and PEI as it forms "locally-raised" clergy. The School is also exploring other models of evaluation for non-degree students and individuals from indigenous communities in the far north. We are also redeveloping our Classics Fellowship to suit our new circumstances following defederation with Laurentian University.

I am excited that we are launching more “micro-credits” in various areas of pastoral studies. Such courses allow student to simply take one credit in an area of focus or, if they wish a full 3-credit course, enrol in all of a series of micro-credit courses. In spring term of this year, such micro-credits are being offered in the area of preaching. In spring of 2026, we will focus on the pastoral offices of the church, such as a ministry to the sick and funerals.

We continue to collaborate with Huron University College in London, ON, and we are exploring similar arrangements with the Anglican Studies Program at the University of St. Paul in Ottawa and St John’s College in Winnipeg. We are looking to serve indigenous students and other involved in the Bishop Tom Corston School of Theology in the Diocese of Moosonee.

One of the conditions of Thorneloe’s land lease with Laurentian University is that Thorneloe must keep teaching at the university level. Since defederation, this condition continues to be met fully by the School of Theology.

When we became defederated, we lost access to our library. The cost to gain access to an academic library at this point is 10/11,000. We are exploring ways to have access to libraries not only to widen availability of resources, but also to ensure students develop the skills to do academic research.

This spring Brian Koivu stepped down from a very successful term as the chair of the Board of Governors. We welcome Gilles Tessier as the new chair of the Board. Both individuals have served, and will continue to serve Thorneloe with great dedication.

We also thank Archbishop Anne Germond for her inspiring leadership as Thorneloe’s Chancellor. The Archbishop’s service in this capacity wrapped up in November of 2024. We are delighted that The Rev. Dr. Patti Brace has stepped into the role as +Anne’s successor.

Finally, we thank the Synod of Algoma for its ongoing interest and support of Thorneloe. While challenges remain before us, as they do for the whole church, Thorneloe is feeling very positive and hopeful about its future!
